

COLLEGE STUDENTS, YOU CAN VOTE!

College students are considered “residents” of Virginia as long as they are enrolled in a Virginia higher education institution. That means that all college students can vote in this November’s election.

To vote, you must fill out a voter registration form, which you can do online at vote.elections.virginia.gov/VoterInformation

“A dormitory or college address can be an acceptable residential address and does not disqualify you from voting.” – Virginia Dept of Elections

You can register to vote through 10/23, but if you miss that deadline, you can also do same-day voter registration on Election Day, 11/3.
You can vote any time 9/18–11/3.

AND WHAT WOULD IT DO?

Question 1 asks Virginians to vote on a constitutional amendment that would create a "fundamental right" to unlimited, unregulated abortion.

Current Virginia law already protects abortion access in the first two trimesters for any reason, and in the third trimester with the consent of three doctors.

Virginia also has a medical necessity clause that protects abortion at any stage if there is a medical emergency.

Question 1 would make elective later abortions legal in Virginia. That means dismemberment abortions on healthy babies, in healthy pregnancies, past the point where they can survive outside the womb.

This is too extreme. 70% of Americans oppose legalizing abortion in the third trimester.
